REFUSE TO BE SILENCED.

How do I vote?

To vote, you need to show proof of your identity & address. You have 3 options to do this:

Show 1 piece of ID with your photo, name and current address. E.g. driver's license or status card. Any card issued by the Canadian government is accepted.

Show 2 pieces of non-photo ID. Both must have your name and at least one must list your current address. E.g. a bank statement, utility bill or voter information card. These do not have to be issued by the Canadian Government.

If you don't have ID, you can write down your name and address on any piece of paper and bring it to your polling station. Then, you must be someone you know confirm it at the polling station. The person confirming your identity must be assigned to your polling station and be able to prove their own identity with accepted ID.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When is the election?

The Federal election is on September 20, 2021.

Can you vote if you are 2Spirit or gender diverse?

Yes. You can vote whether your I.D. says "F", "M", or "X". And, you can show identification with different gender markers, as long as your name and address are the same.

If you aren't registered, you will need to select a gender marker at the polling station, which now includes an "X" option.

What happens if my appearence no longer matches my ID?

You do not need to look like your I.D. to vote. However, a poll worker may ask you why your photo doesn't match your appearance.

Are there accessible options for voters?

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



What happens if I changed my legal name, but haven't registered with it for voting?

If you haven't contacted Elections Canada to change your legal name your registration will not match your voter card and will be invalid.

You can update your name by re-registering at the polling station or online. To do so you will need to fill in a Registration Certificate, at elections.ca. This form is only guarenteed to be valid for the current election. To ensure your name is updated for the next election contact Elections Canada at 1-800-463-6868.

If I'm not registered to vote, is it too late?

No, its not too late! You can still go to your polling station and register in person. To find out your polling station visit elections.ca.





FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



Can I vote if I am living in a shelter, houseless, or temporarily housed?

Yes. You can use the address of your shelter, people you are staying with, or the address of a place you get services from. In all of these cases, you will still need to show proof of your name and address. See page 1 for how to do this with or without ID.

Can I get a ride to vote?

Yes, you can. Call your local party candidate to find out what transportation services they have in place. You can find out your local candidate at www.elections.ca.

Are there polling stations on reserves?

Yes. Polling stations are established on reserves when the polling division is completely or mostly made up of that reserve. In most cases, the polling station is located at the band council office or the community centre.
